BLACK MEN AGED 30-34 ARE INCARCERATED AT MORE THAN 5 TIMES RATE OF WHITE MEN

1 IN 91 WHITE MEN

IN 99% OF U.S. NEIGHBORHOODS, BLACK BOYS EARN LESS IN ADULTHOOD THAN WHITE BOYS WHO GROW UP IN FAMILIES WITH A COMPARABLE INCOME.



BLACK MEN 18 AND OLDER HAVE **HIGHEST** ADJUSTED ALL-CAUSE MORTALITY RATE AND **WORST** HEALTH STATUS OF ANY ETHNIC-SEX GROUP IN U.S.
